

I did my best to lead him back to God and after some time got him taken back at the Home. I only regret I cannot send you a donation, but my present position does not allow me honestly to do so. But when God blesses me with that power I will not forget. With my prayers, Yours, etc."

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We should like to take this opportunity of thanking our many friends who helped by their gifts to make the Christmas time a bright and happy one for our children. Could you have popped in and seen how the children were enjoying themselves you would in some measure have realised how your kind thoughts were appreciated by all. Quite a number of our old children came home for the Christmas and to the glory of God we say there was no lack.

We are sorry to report that our dear friend Mr. Hunt who greatly helped us during the past year in decorating some of our rooms and in carpentering, without payment, has been called to his Eernal Rest. We shall miss a friend and a supporter and would ask the prayers of our readers for his wife and relatives who are left.

Prayer is asked for this boy. "Just a few lines to let you know that I am getting on very well indeed. I shall be coming home on the 19th, Thursday week. If you don't mind I shall be pleased to spend Xmas and Boxing Days with you. On Friday I am passing another examination in signals, and if I pass I shall come home with my P.O. boy's rating and signal rating. In answer to your last letter, I have a Bible with me and our chaplain gives me a Bible-reading card every month and I read my Bible twice a day. Of course there was a bit of joking going round when I first started reading because they thought I was joking, but when they found out that I seriously meant to read it they put joking alongside and left me alone. After Xmas I will have an increase of work to do and then there are two more exams to pass and then I shall go to sea. With love."

Prayer is asked for this girl. "I am sorry to trouble you, but I am thinking of leaving my place as they are selling up and going to live far away, and I am not caring to do this. I feel it is my duty to be nearer you and it is only proper that I should come and see you all when it is my evening off, so could you please let me know what you think about the matter and I will leave it with you to make all arrangements. I hope you are all well and your daily needs and wants are being supplied. My prayers are for you all. I don't think a night passes without I remember you all to God in my prayers for the children's health, which is splendid according to the lot of illness there is about; also for more of them to be brought to Jesus, and for sisters who are under your care. I hope as they grow older they may love Jesus more. I always feel I want to serve Him better and do more work for Him."

EVANGELISTIC WORK.

About three or four years ago I got in touch with a Mr. Fred Sackett in rather a remarkable way and since that time we have had the pleasure at intervals of going out together to preach the Gospel with a Gospel car and tent which the Lord sent to our brother in answer to special prayer. Southwood, Ramsgate, was, I think, our first pitch together and we had some good times. We went during the day to Margate sands where we had some blessed times, and into Ramsgate, Broadstairs and Birchington and the surrounding villages, where we held meetings, returning to Southwood for the children's and adults' services, and God owned and blessed

His Word. One morning, while preaching on Margate sands to a good crowd of people, it commenced to rain and the people started going away. We told them not to go as we would ask the Lord to stop the rain. This remark caused the crowd to laugh, but having prayed loudly to this effect, the rain instantly stopped until the close of our meeting. Thus our gracious Lord answered our prayers much to the amazement of the people.

We also had a very blessed time at Miller's Field, Canterbury, where souls were saved and backsliders restored. After one meeting we spoke to two maids who said that they had been saved a month before, but who had lost

the joy of salvation through falling into sin. The eldest one who was in service told us that the cat had got into the pantry and made for a leg of mutton, bringing the meat and a big dish to the floor, breaking the dish, when she discovered this she got into a passion and swore at the cat. On telling her experience to the leader of the meeting where she attended, she had been told that she was now lost. We pointed out to her from the Word of God the awfulness of sin and gladly showed her I John ii, 1, which she readily obeyed and restoration followed.

We had too a most blessed time in the hop fields at Selling in Kent, the two of us living in the car which was placed in a big field surrounded by a few thousand hop-pickers from our London slums. We went among them during the day, sometimes helping them pick their hops and inviting them to meetings in the tent when the day's work was over. We got at the children first through services held especially for them and had some play with them too, and through

the children to the parents, who crowded the tent, especially on the last night, and I shall never forget the sight when my dear brother appealed for decisions—no less than twenty adults came out on the Lord's side.

Mr. Sackett is now an evangelist for The Open Air Mission, whose Head Office is 19, John Street, Bedford Row, which society is worthy of your interest and prayers as they send evangelists all over the country preaching the glorious old Gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. I, too, have found great pleasure in having fellowship with this society and preaching for them when free. It has also been my privilege to address other meetings in Stoke Newington, Muswell Hill, Woodford, Stratford, Chingford, Abridge, Walthamstow, Lambourne, etc., when souls have been won for the Master. Both Mr and Mrs. Sackett are keenly interested in the work of the Home and do all they can in their spare moments to assist this corner of His vineyard.

shredded wheat, 1 lb flaked rice, 2 packets flaked rice, 1 packet rolled oats, 2 lbs apple jam, 1 packet coffee mixture, 1 box toffee, 7 lbs golden syrup, 1 lb apples, 3 bars soap, 6 hats, 10 scarfs, 5 petticoats, 1 jersey. You can guess how delighted we were to receive such a token as this, and how we thank God for telling His child to help us in this way. Barkway 4 pairs knickers, 1 dress, parcel of second hand clothes, London 6 dolls, paper chains and toys, Anon. two turkeys, for these we specially thank God as the dear friend who usually sent us turkeys at Christmas time died early in December, 1911, and no turkeys came that Christmas, but this year the Lord has touched the

heart of a friend to supply this our need and the children were certainly delighted with them; 100 oranges, 1 Christmas pudding 2 lots of toys, 1 baby's rattle from Ireland, From Woodford 6s 8d, £1. 3s, Highams Park £1 15s 6d, From one of our old girls 2s 8d, Ilford 1s, Limehouse 5s, Hertford £10 with "Please accept my truest sympathy and sincerest hopes that the measles may not spread further and that all may soon recover. I feel very much for you at this season. Please accept enclosed as a Christmas offering with very best wishes for all in the Home.

22nd. Our Leytonstone Friend writes, "We are sending you for the Homes 1 box containing 28 lbs broken biscuits and 28 lbs soda and further from the Civil Service Stores a box containing 28 lbs haricot beans 7 lbs cornflour, 4 packets table jellies, 7 lbs pearl barley and this I think will complete the gifts of the friends at Leytonstone and elsewhere collected by my dear wife. We pray for your rich blessing and help at all times and hope you may be spared any more sickness, God willing, but nevertheless increased grace to endure. Would like if it were possible to look in and see you all enjoying yourselves next week." (This we certainly did), 20 pairs of stockings, 1 counterpane, 7 pinafores from our Seven Kings Sewing Meeting, Woodford £3 13s 6d collected by the employees of a Woodford draper who went round the neighbourhood carol singing. They and we were delighted with the splendid result, Forest Gate 1 guinea, From one of Woodford Sunday Schools 1 suit, two shirts, 2 pairs of stockings, 1 pair of boots, 1 pair of braces, 1 cap, 1 overcoat to fit a boy. This gift was quite unique, the scholars in this Sunday School are encouraged to bring Christmas gifts for the poor, which they do on the Sunday before Christmas, when each class enjoys the privilege of being able to vote their gifts to wherever they choose. One of the classes conceived the idea that instead of buying toys, etc, and send them to us it would be more beneficial to buy a complete outfit for one of our boys, this was done and on the appointed Sunday in answer to the call for the gifts of this particular class, the boy dressed in the outfit appeared upon the platform, much to the astonishment of all. May God bless the teacher and the class.

OBJECTS OF THE WORK.

1. To receive destitute and motherless children.
 2. To be the means in God's hands of bringing these children to know the Lord Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour.
