### EDITORIAL NOTES.

With this fifth number of our "Links" we close our thirteenth year and at once raise a note of grateful thanks to our gracious God for permitting us the great privilege of again recording His dealings with this work. We feel like the Psalmist of old who said, "My soul shall make her boast in the Lord, the humble shall hear thereof and be glad." We realise to-day as much as ever that we have nothing to boast of in ourselves, but we can and do boast in Him and glory in the fact that "He is" and "is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him." Further we realise that as we tell others what He has done for us and through us it shall bring joy to the hearts of those who belong to Him, for "the humble shall hear thereof and be glad."

We started the year with 55 children and have now 61 in the Home; three boys and two girls have left for work and service, and three girls and one boy have been returned to their relatives on account of the surviving parent re-marrying, or for other reasons.

The health of the children has been well maintained during the past year, an outbreak of measles at Christmastime being the only thing to report.

The income has been the largest we have received amounting to over £642, the next largest being £493 received the previous year. We had a splendid send off in May, 1912, by a special thankoffering for £100 which came as a re-assuring token of His Power and willingness to supply the needs of those who trust in Him.

We have also been greatly cheered by the gifts in kind and clothes (old and new), boots, blankets, etc., which we have received during the twelve months and which have greatly assisted us in our fight for the children

The Sewing Meetings have again rendered us good service during the year and we give here the report which our Seven Kings friends have sent. "We have great pleasure in issuing this our Seventh Annual Refort and we are glad to say that we have had another successful year, working as we do for the benefit of the children at South Woodford. We still hold our meetings for work every Tuesday afternoon from 3 to 6 p.m., and shall be most pleased to welcome any friends who would like to help us in this good work. We owe

a debt of gratitude to those who from time to time come to read and speak to us of Him who is the Giver of all good gifts, feeling that the service rendered has been beneficial to us all. We very much regret to state that several of our members have been laid aside during the year by illness and that has somewhat curtailed the number of garments we have been able to make this year. Some of our members, as usual, attended the Annual Meetings in May, at South Woodford, and thoroughly enjoyed themselves there. Our best thanks are also due to our dear friend, Mrs. C. H. White, for her great assistance in cutting out all the garments for making, and also to those kind friends who assisted us with monetary donations and gifts of goods. During the year 1912 the following garments and boots have been forwarded to the Home:—38 pinafores, 12 nightdresses. 24 undergurments, 11 jumpers, 2 pillow cases, 2 blouses, 1 pillow tick, 1 overall, 1 counterpane, 20 pairs stockings, total 112 garments, and 16 pairs of boots. Again thanking all those friends who assisted us in the past, we look forward to another successful year's work in 1913. Trusting that God will abundantly bless our labours in the future as He has done in the past. Yours in the work, (Mrs.) H. Hutchings, Hon. Sec.

Our friend responsible for the Boot Club has been continuing her kind labours and has sent in no less than 39 pairs during the past year, having collected in pennies from her friends the sum of £7 17s, 0d. These have been greatly appreciated and we feel sure that the "Inasmuch" blessing shall be the portion of all who have helped in this.

We are sorry to report that our dear friend, Mrs. Fowler. of "Glebelands," Woodford, who was one of our first subscribers has been called to her Eternal Rest. Another friend, Mr. F. J. Braham, has been called Home after a painful illness, and we would ask our readers to specially pray for these bereaved ones. This makes the fourth friend we have lost by death during the last few months.

Friends desirous of seeing over the Home can do so any afternoon between 3 and 5 o'clock except Sundays and Mondays and children can be seen by their relatives and friends every Saturday between 6 and 8 o'clock.

"Children's Home Links" will be sent to any friends on receipt of 6d. post free for the year. No. 6 will be out in August containing the annual Meeting speeches.

# SUNDAY SCHOOL.

The work under this head is still well maintained. We have an earnest body of teachers who take a great interest in our children and it is encouraging to note that several of them come from different parts of the neighbourhood Sunday by Sunday to help us in this work. From the Sunday School account you will see that the class box collections were very good,—an improvement on last year.—The children are still keenly interested in the support of Stephen who is a native of Hindupur and who is being trained there as an evangelist. Our children have entirely kept this lad for the past several years from Sunday School funds. Through the kindness of churches and friends our children were able to join the neighbouring Sunday Schools in their united excursion to Clacton-on-Sea last June which they greatly appreciated and we are D.V. looking forward to join again this year, the date fixed being 25th. June.

### A FORWARD MOVE.

Our friends will be glad to know that we have been enabled during the past mouth to take a forward step. For the past eight years I, with my wife and family, have occupied hree rooms in the Home. The way has now been opened for us to take a small house

opposite, which our brother, Mr. Fred Sackett is sharing with us. We find this to be more beneficial, as our little family of three are growing up, and it will be to their advantage to live under a separate roof. Further we are now enabled to increase the Home to the extent of about six more children and to the better re-arrange the place, and so make it more comfortable for workers and children. We would ask for the special prayers of our friends concerning this step, as we do not intend to draw from the "Home" funds for our support, but to rely only upon the arm of God to supply our small needs, and only such funds as come in, marked specially for us, shall be devoted for the upkeep of "Home Cot," which we have named our new abode. We feel that this will be more glorifying to God. Whilst we have been living at the "Home" all money sent specially to us has been placed in the Home funds towards our keep, it will be encouraging to know that the necessary clothes, etc., have always been specially supplied by our Gracious God.
