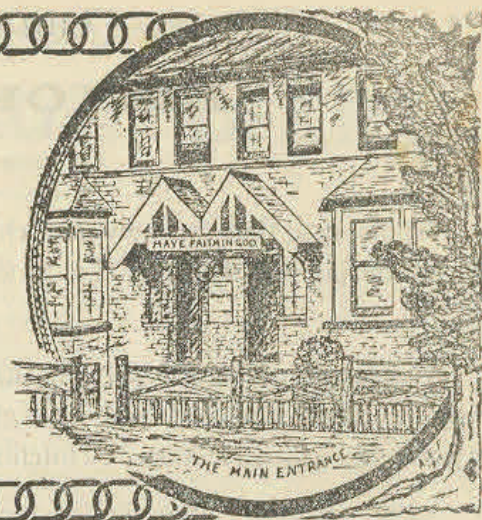

We praise God for the good health of workers and children, also that He has been pleased to supply our needs and thus giving us the privilege of serving Him in this way. Prayer is still asked for Miss F. Hutchin (Auntie) who is still with us, but very feeble.

For Prayer for Guidance.

We shall be glad if our friends will have fellowship with us in prayer re the following :—

For some time past we have been desirous of enlarging our borders on account of the many applications received and we now have offered to us an Estate, about 10 miles from here, Freehold for £3,500 comprising nearly 11 acres with large main building capable of sleeping two to three hundred children, with Isolation Infirmary and Hospital, separate Cook House and Laundry, also detached School Building with class rooms.

We are paying in rent and rates for our present buildings over £200 a year and can only accommodate 70 children. Our present grounds, too, are small and surrounded by houses—the new offer is beautifully situated in the country and surrounded by farm lands.

An independent Surveyor and our Medical Officer have inspected same and think it would be just the thing for a work of this kind.

We realise that this would be a great undertaking, but not too great for "The One" whom we have been serving for the past 22 years. We are, therefore, most anxious to know HIS WILL and only desirous of moving when He gives us clear indications of what He wants us to do. Will you pray that if this be His will for us the necessary amount may be forthcoming, which will be a token to us to "Go Forward."

In the event of our being able to buy same Trustees will be appointed to hold the Deeds and to see that the buildings are used for the purpose for which they are bought.

A difficulty may be a real one, but it is only unbelief of heart that will make it an obstacle, if on the path of God's will. Faith reckons upon God, and difficulties are nothing to Him.
