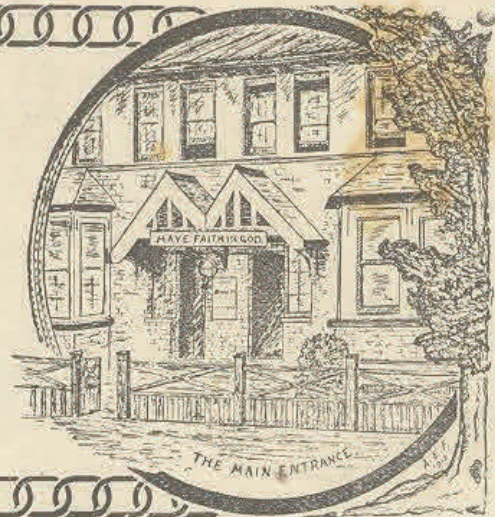

THIS issue of *Links* is a little late, but we were quite unable through pressure of work to get same out as we usually do before Christmas. We nevertheless trust our friends had a happy time during the Festive Season, and pray that 1923 may bring joy and blessing in increasing fashion, with a deepened desire to faithful service for Him Whom our hearts love. Without question, our *Happiness* and *Joy* and *Faithfulness* can only be our experience and *Fruit* as we live in fellowship with God through Christ, and seek the *separated unto Him* life. When our Lord appeared to the two on the way to Emmaus we read, "And beginning at Moses and all the prophets He expounded unto them in all the scriptures the things concerning Himself." (Luke xxiv. 27.) May we feed upon the *Scriptures* more than ever this year that our lives may tell for Him. We have been thinking again of His first Advent. With the first sin came the promise of a Saviour. "The seed of the woman shall bruise the serpent's head." Nothing was said in this promise as to person, place, or time; for four thousand years it was developing, and the way of the Lord was being prepared by types, shadows, prophesies and special revelation.

The promise was simply that He should be human. "The seed of the woman." In Abraham's time the nation from which He should come was declared; "In thee and thy seed." In the days of Jacob, the tribe; "The sceptre shall not depart from Judah... until Shiloh come." In Isaiah's time, the family;

"There shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse and a Branch shall grow out of his roots." Finally the Person in that family is named; "Fear not Mary, for thou hast found favour of God and shall bring forth a Son and shall call His name JESUS."

No mention was made in the first promise of the *place* of its fulfilment. In the time of Abraham the *country* in which He should appear was revealed, viz. the land of Canaan. "Thy seed shall possess the Land." In the time of Jacob the "Allotment of Judah" is pointed out, and the place to which Shiloh should come. In the days of Micah the *town* in the allotment of Judah is mentioned. "And thou Bethlehem Ephratah," etc. Finally the *house* in which He was born was revealed. "The Star came and stood over where the young Child was."

In the first promise nothing whatever was said as to the *time* when it should be fulfilled, so that when Eve gave birth to Cain she said, "I have gotten the God-man," imagining, as some suppose, that the promise would then be performed, but the hope was disappointed, and she called her next-born "Vanity." But in the days of Abraham it was promised He should come during the "continuance of this race." In Jacob's time, that He should come while Judah held the sceptre. In Daniel's time, that the Messiah should come in 70 weeks of years, which, reckoned up, comes to 490. In the time of Haggai it was revealed that during the "continuance of the second temple" the "desire of all nations should come." To Simeon, an old man, "that he

should not die till he had seen the Lord's Christ," and finally to the shepherds the *very day* is declared. "This day is born in the city of David a Saviour which is CHRIST THE LORD."

All through the ages God had been developing His revelations step by step, line upon line, here a little and there a little, from the beginning of time, when the first ray of light pierced the darkness which fell on the world with the first sin, until the fulness of the time had come and God sent forth His Son to be the Light of the World.

The Place of His birth—Bethlehem, the House of Bread. Here David, whose Psalms were full of God's "Beloved" Son, was born; David, the shepherd who sang upon the hill slopes "The Lord is my Shepherd," was born, and there Jesus the Good Shepherd, who came to give His life for the sheep, was born. Bethlehem is a hallowed spot; here Rachael died and was buried, here Naomi and Ruth dwelt. Rachael, Naomi, Ruth, Mary, what a cluster of interesting names are associated with Bethlehem, six miles south of Jerusalem.

The Time of His birth was not known, the year can be determined but not the date. God has left that unknown. It is not the day or the year of a man's birth that makes him famous, but what the man is in his life, character and work.

All we know for certain is that it was God's appointed time—it was the central day in the history of all time—it was when the fulness of time had come, when the sceptre had departed from Judah and an alien king was upon his throne, when the voice of prophesy was hushed, when visions had ceased, and all men were in expectation and when devout hearts waited anxiously, looking for the redemption of Israel.

The circumstances of His birth. These were, in the nature of the case, all against His being born there; His parents were dwelling in Nazareth many miles from Bethlehem. A decree was sent forth by Cæsar Augustus that all Jews were to be taxed, and every one had to repair to his own city and town for that purpose, and so Joseph and Mary went to Bethlehem, and the result worked out the Will of God and the fulfilment of prophesy—that Christ should be born in Bethlehem of Judea—for thus Micah prophesied of Him 700 years before.

And thus it is recorded, "And so it was,

that while they were there, she brought forth her first-born Son, and wrapped Him in swaddling clothes and laid Him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn." Born of a woman, yet very God of very God, begotten of the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, the Son of Man, the Wonderful, the Counsellor, the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace—yet bone of our bone, and flesh of our flesh. We exclaim with the apostle, "Great is the mystery of Godliness!"

Let us therefore read and believe Hebrews chapter IX., and pray for power to live in the light of *His Second Coming*.

Our children are well, and the Home is still quite full. Many are waiting to come in, and there are no houses near that we could take. We are still praying about the building of a Dining Hall, etc. here, which would then enable us to use other rooms as dormitories.
