

EDITORIAL NOTES

We are late with out Links this year through unavoidable circumstances, but "better late than never." We have, however, the same story to tell that the God in whom we trust through the Lord Jesus Christ is the Living God, and able to deliver those who love and follow Him. "Faithful is He who calleth

you who also do it."

Our 26th Annual Gatherings were held in the Woodford Baptist Church on the 6th May, 1926, at 3.80 and 7 p.m. Owing to the lamented general strike our programme was greatly interfered with. Mr. V. G. Levett, Mr. Richard Cadbury, Dr. Dinsdale, T. Young, Rev. W. Leonard B. Caley, and Rev. John Wilmot were unable to travel to the meetings much to our disappointment. The only billed speaker who came was Mrs. J. T. Inskip, who spoke at the afternoon meeting, and gave us a very inspiring address, for which we praise God. The Rev. John Jermyn also kindly filled the gap by giving a helpful address, and Mr. W. C. Johnson occupied the chair. The evening meeting was chaired by Mr. J. Bloom, and Mr. James Stokes kindly came at short notice, and his address was very much appreciated. At both meetings Mr. Bruce Flegg gave messages in song, which indeed were a great blessing. Under the circumstances we had good gatherings with a goodly number to tea between the meetings and at the close of the day we felt it had been good to be there.

Our Medical Officer, Dr. F. A. Martin Flegg, in his report spoke about the good health of the children and workers, and but for minor complaints, the really wonderful health of the Home had been maintained throughout another year. He emphasised that each child was medically examined before entering the Home.

During the year 10 children have left us, six for work, and 22 children have been admitted, making now 70 in the Home, or 371 who have been under our care since the start. Many of these have confessed their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ as Saviour, and are now serving Him in different parts of the world.

As you will see from the Diary the hearts of many have been touched to assist us by sending gifts in kind, and on many occasions just at the right moment the necessary things have been sent in for our immediate use. Our fish still comes every Tuesday and Thursday in 56lbs. lots from our friend who was led by the Lord some ten years ago to help in this way. cocoa, and bootlaces have also been supplied by three different friends again during the year. The Harvest gifts from neighbouring churches were also again very acceptable. Our working parties too helped as during the 12 months by sending over 400 garments.

Our 26th Balance Sheet shows a balance carried forward of £45 9s. 11d. which is another proof that our "Father" has moved the hearts of many to assist us financially again, as all our accounts have been met with this little amount in hand. 801 receipts were issued during the year apart from the boxes, and often when we were needing money to meet our accounts we have proved that man's extremity was

God's opportunity.

Our Home Sunday School account also shows a balance of £3 0s. 7d., and we have been able to help in a small way four Missionary Societies from this Fund, which is also training our own children to be unselfish and think of others.

The Fund of The Florence Barclay Memorial Hall which we are hoping to start building shortly has increased by £208 13s. 7d, during the year, and there is now an amount of £1,060 6s. 1d. to this account. Since the 30th April, 1926, we have added another £80 0s. 4d., which makes now the total of £1,140 6s. 5d. in the Bank. The Architect and Builder have overhauled the plans and specifications again, and the builder has now reduced his tender from £2,780 to We have £100 left to us in a Will should a £2.250. lady die or re-marry, and another friend has promised £50 making £1,290 6s. 5d. So that we require just over £950 to Open the Memorial Hall free of debt. Will our friends please pray.

Our Special Prayer and Praise meeting each second Thursday in the month at 3 p.m., have been seasons of real blessing and we trust that friends will gather

with us whenever able.
