"OUR DAY."

Our 38th annual Gatherings were held in the Woodford Baptist Church, (kindly lent) on Thursday, June 9th, 1938.

The chair was taken by Mr. HERBERT WHITE at 3.30 the speakers being the Rev. GEOFFREY R. KING (East London Tabernacle) and the Rev. JOHN PRITCHARD (Leigh Road Baptist Church.)

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Mr. White said: We are very glad to come together again for our anniversary meetings, and to see such a fine company who have gathered to praise God with us. We thank God for disposing the hearts of so many of our friends to meet with us here.

We have had a splendid year, from many points of view. Naturally in a work of this kind there have been many difficulties; but the blessings more than balance the difficulties; and on this our 38th annual meeting we lift up our Ebenezer, and praise God for his goodness, knowing that right up to this very moment He has helped us. It is a great privilege to have any part at all in doing work for God. I believe that Christianity, rightly interpreted, would be unselfishness. We thank God for that love which He has shed abroad in our hearts; we thank Him for the service to which He has brought us, and for the blessed results that He has given us through the years. When God was dealing with the Children of Israel in days gone by, we read, "Because the Lord loved you, and because He would keep the oath which He swear unto your fathers, hath the Lord brought you out with a mighty hand." We cannot say why God has loved us; we know that none of us deserves His love; but His love is immeasurable, and it is so great that it includes the whole world. It is a love which "passeth knowledge." It is unsurpassable. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." We are here to-day, not because of ourselves, but in spite of ourselves, and because of His great sacrifice on our behalf. If only people generally realised this truth what a wonderful world it would be! God's love is perfect. We praise God that His love has reached our hearts, we who are labouring in this work. We thank Him for our own salvation, and for that love of His which fills our own souls. During the past year we have been seeking to serve the children because we are serving Him; we have been seeking to lead these little ones to the Lord, because we want them to enjoy those same spiritual blessings that we possess.

Last year we had 76 children in the Home. We received 15, and 19 have left us, making now a total of 72. Since the start of the work, no less than 576 children have been helped. Many of them are converted, and are seeking to follow the Lord in their lives. It is always a joy to receive letters from our old boys and girls; and we Praise God for the interest they still show in the work. Our children sat for the Scripture Examination this year; 37 of the 40 passed, three with honours; twenty-one first-class, and thirteen second-class certificates.

We have had a wonderful year of health and blessing. When our annual meetings were being held last year my old car was running out; and about a fortnight afterwards it went quite wrong, and I had to sell it for 50/-; but a week before this happened, a good brother from St. Albans brought to me the one I am now using, and asked my acceptance of it in the name of the Lord. We have received many gifts which are innumerable in the Diary. We want to thank those who have sent parcels of clothes, and for all the members of Working-Parties for their help; two friends also have collected money amongst their friends for our boot fund.

Financially, although things have been very difficult in the world around, we have had the largest turnover we have ever had; the total amount received during the year being £4,144 10. 0. including £513 from our Forward Move a/c. And after meeting all our liabilities we have been able to carry forward a balance of £524 9. 11. So that you see God has again been gracious to us in hearing and in answering our prayers. We have no Church, no denomination behind us. We do not look to people for help, we look to God; and He has never let us down.

The MEDICAL OFFICER Dr. W. ERIC MATHIE said: I am told that in China a medical officer is engaged by a family and paid fees so long as he keeps the family in good health. If we applied that to Mr. White's Homes Dr. SMITH and myself would be very rich indeed. The health of the children has been very good this year, in spite of the 1,175 hot cross buns! There was a slight epidemic of German Measles, which caused a little bit of excitement. But, apart from that, the number of visits that had to be paid to the Home were considerably less this year than the previous years. I personally consider it a great privilege to have any share in the Lord's work in the Home. As time goes on I become more and more attached to these children.

The Rev. GEOFFREY KING said: There is a strong Roman Catholic and High Church element where I live, and I am always getting mistaken for someone else. The other day I was walking down one of our streets and a wee girlie, whose mother was laden with bags and parcels, stumbled over. I lifted her up again, and the mother said "Thank you, father, Gawd bless you." That is what we have come here to say to Mr. White. That word "father is not a misnomer for him. We say to him, "Thank you, father, God bless you." He is one of the bravest fathers I have ever known; and it did our hearts good to hear that the great Father above during this 38th year has caused His smile to rest upon this work yet again.

I am under orders to give a little word. There is a sentence in Mark iv. 36. which I think furnishes a message for this afternoon. In the story of the stilling of the storm, Mark is the only one of the evangelists who puts in this little sentence "And there were also, with him other little ships." Surely, you say, it would have been a noteworthy thing if there had not been "other little ships" with Jesus. We believe that Mark received his story of the life of Jesus from Peter, and Peter, with that keen eye of his, was always giving details to Mark, and which we find only in his Gospel. And Mark was careful to add this detail in his telling of the story, that on that night on the Sea of Galilee there were with Jesus "other little ships." I think it must have been because Peter remembered how the next morning there was only one topic of conversation on the shores of Galilee; all the fishermen were talking about the storm of the night before, for that storm was different from any storm they had ever experienced before. The rising of the storm was the same as usual; but the stilling of the storm was entirely different. It was a very common thing for these storms suddenly to spring up; I understand that the nature of the mountainous district made it so; the wind gathering force on the mountains rushed down on to the Lake resulting in one of those short, sharp squalls. On this occasion the storm had suddenly come; and at the word of Jesus the wind ceased, and the sea immediately grew calm. Generally the wind would die down, but the sea would be left tossing and surging for hours afterwards. But on this occasion not only did the wind cease, but the sea in a moment

became still. They had never known that to happen before; and Peter the next morning was able to tell the other fishermen just how it was. He was able to say proudly "Our Master was on board my boat last night. I have never seen anything so marvellous. He stood there on the brow of my boat, and He lifted up His hand and said one word, and in a moment the wind ceased and the sea became calm." "The angry deep sank as a little child to sleep." That was what made the stilling of the storm so remarkable. I suppose that was why Peter remembered it, and why Mark put it into the story. The storm was stilled; their labours were suddenly brought to an end; their fears were all dispelled, and many lives were saved; just because on board the boat of Simon Peter there was the Lord Jesus Christ; and that meant so much to so many.

"There were also with him other little ships." One has great rejoicings in an anniversary of a work like this, for when God blesses one man that man never is able to keep that blessing to himself. The story of this work is that God blesses the heart of one, and through that one many others are blessed. The work that has been put into this Home during the past year has been the story of blessing coming into the warm loving hearts of a devoted band of workers, and with them there have been those other little ships, and they have all reaped the benefit. God never blesses a man or woman singly. When God blessed Abraham He said, 'I will make you a blessing, and in you and in your seed shall all the families of the earth be blessed. The next morning what a number of new disciples Jesus must have made through the stilling of the storm. We little know, if Jesus Christ is in charge of our lives, how many more are being drawn to Him. We little knew how when we were taken by God into that storm, when that trouble came upon us, when those deep waters surged around us, and when God gave us such a marvellous peace, we little knew in that hour how Jesus was speaking to the other little ships. It may be that that blinding sorrow was sent into your life just in order that Christ might speak peace from on board there to the other little ships that were all around you. My dear friends, you who work in this Home, Jesus Christ is in charge of your life; He is on board your life; He rules your daily life. I question whether even in Heaven you will know what Jesus in you has meant to these other little ships. May God bless you. Shall we know even in eternity all that our simple remembrance of others has meant to them. "The weary ones had rest." I just call those lines to mind; and the reason given is that a ploughman singing at his work had prayed, and the next verse tells us how those in a foreign country, how their simple word took on a new power. It was because far away on bended knee one or two of their remembrancers had gathered to pray for them. As Mark tells the story it seems as if those other little ships had gone out with Jesus of set purpose; they had felt so drawn to Him that they purposely set sail. If that be so, what a tremendous impression He must have made! And so if Christ is in control of our lives, we little know how we are influencing others for Him. May God richly bless you in your work for Him.

The Rev. JOHN PRITCHARD said: I want to say from the depth of my heart how grateful I am for this privilege of being able in some small way to serve the work of the Homes in whose interests we are gathered together this afternoon. I have not known the work of the Homes for very long but I have been exceedingly interested in all that I have learned of them. I was delighted to have the privilege of visiting the Homes, and seeing the children, and of realising how richly God is blessing the work.

In thinking of the message for to-day I believe I have been divinely guided to the 121st Psalm. You cannot leave anything out of it, and so I bring the whole Psalm to you because I believe the Lord would have me pass it on to you

who are responsible for the work of this Home as His own message of promise and assurance for the year that is to come. This is a Psalm which belongs to a group of fifteen psalms which are known as the songs of ascent. We are not quite sure how they were used. In all probability they were composed to be sung by the pilgrims going up to Jerusalem to the Feast. Maybe, they sang this Psalm when they first caught sight of the goal of their journey. As they came within sight of the mountains and of the holy city there were awakened within them all kinds of memories, and they would burst forth into song. "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills. From whence shall my help come?" It is a question in the original. They realised that their help came, not from the hills that surrounded the wonderful city of Jerusalem; but from Jehovah "which hath made heaven and earth." The hearts of those pilgrims would be warmed as they saw those marvellous hills; and their minds went in thought beyond the hills, with all their sacred associations, to the Maker of the hills. Let us lift up our eyes unto the hills and think of some of the things that we associate with them, but let us go higher still, and lift up our hearts and minds unto the God of the hills.

What is the message of the mountains? The mountains bring to us the thought of sanctity. There is something wonderfully sacred about the mountains; there is something so calm and peaceful about the mountains; if we look upon the mountains through eyes that have been opened to see in nature the handiwork of God. It was to a mountain that God came when He gave the law, and that mountain became for ever sacred. Yes, there is a certain sanctity about the hills; and we need this sanctity in our lives today. As we look around upon the world today it would seem as if everything sacred was fading out of our life; we are losing the things that are sacred to-day, including the Lord's own Day. Oh, that we might regain our sense of sanctity!

And is there not a wonderful sense of security when we think of the hills? "They that trust in the Lord shall be as Mount Zion." "The Lord is round about His people from henceforth even for evermore." There is that sense of security about the mountains that inspires us and fills us with hope and confidence. Then there is a calm about the hills that have weathered the storms of ages. How serene they are! And is there not a need for such serenity in these modern days. In the midst of all the turmoil and the unrest we need that sense of calm and peace and serenity. But do you know we can only experience that as we look at things from God's point of view. Only as we ascend the hill of the Lord, and look down upon the events of this world from a higher altitude, only then can we have that true serenity and peace. If I had not been permitted by God to come to an understanding of the unfolding of God's purpose, I should be far from calm and peaceful as I look around at the trouble and turmoil of the world to-day. When we get into the atmosphere of the mountain with its calm and serenity then we realise that God is above everything, and that our sovereign Lord will cause all things to work together for our good and for His glory.

A few years ago I had the joy and privilege of climbing Snowdon in the company of about eighty public school boys. It was a grand climb. When we got to the top the mists were falling, and we could see nothing for a while; then the mists parted, and we could see in a most wonderful way the unrolling of the mists, and the sunlight shining down in the valley below. Then the curtains would be drawn again, and the mists would once again blot out the scene below. Yet again the mists would part and we would see the sunlight in the valley. But for a view like that we had to climb. And when we climb into the hill of the Lord we begin to see things from God's point of view, and we find that, after all, God's hand is upon everything; and that is the secret of peace and serenity in the Christian to-day.

A competition once took place in which artists were to paint a picture depicting peace. One artist painted a sea picture, with little sailing ships passing to and fro on the calm sea. Another painted a landscape, with fields of golden corn shining in the sunlight. But the picture which won the prize was that of a terrific storm at sea; the waves were bearing high. But there in the foreground of the picture was a great rock, and in the cleft of the rock there was a nest of young birds, and the mother bird feeding them. The sea was raging; the waves were dashing themselves into spray. But there in the cleft of the rock, sheltered from the storm, was the nest and the mother bird.

Whilst it is perfectly true that the hills remind us of those things which I have mentioned, we need to remember that realities come, not from the hills but from the Lord who made the hills. The place is only sacred because of the presence of God. This Church is sacred, not because of the bricks and mortar; it is only sacred because God is here. It was the presence and revelation of God that made Bethel a sacred place to Jacob. How wonderful it is that the sick one in his or her sick chamber, or the lonely missionary cut off from fellowship with others, can say, "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help? My friends, you who are engaged in this great work, caring for these children, and carrying on the work of the Lord in this place, I am sure your testimony would be—"My help cometh from the Lord which made heaven and earth." Is not that a great statement? The Maker of Heaven and earth. "The earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof." Our Father is a millionaire; a multi-millionaire. He is the Maker of Heaven and earth, and it is from Him that our help comes.

The Lord is also our Keeper, says the psalmist. God's eye is always upon us. There is a precious promise in God's Word which says "I will guide thee with mine eye upon thee." He sees us not only as individuals; but He sees all our circumstances, and He guides us. "He that keepeth thee shall not slumber." And we think too, of His upholding. "He will never suffer thy foot to be moved." God keeps us. He will preserve us from sin. What can harm the one who is kept by God? Oh, the wonderful guidance of God! "The Lord shall preserve thy going out and thy coming in." When we go out into life in the morning of our days, and when we come in at last to die; when we go out to labour, and when we come home to rest; when we go out to serve Him, and when we come in to sit at His feet, He is with us. "Our exits and our entrances are under His protection" says Spurgeon. How precious are all these promises! God it is Who keeps me, and protects me, and guides me, and Who will be with me for evermore in my going out and in my coming in, from this time forth and even for evermore. If you trust in the Lord Jesus Christ and own God as your Father, this Psalm will be proved true in your experience and in mine for evermore.

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EVENING MEETING

At the evening meeting again a large number of friends gathered, and listened with keen pleasure to the delightful singing of the children, and their repetition of Scripture passages. Mr. LEOPOLD HARRIS occupied the chair, and addresses were given by the Rev. E. J. POOLE-CONNOR (Talbot Tabernacle) and Dr. FREDK. T. ELLIS (Bible Testimony Fellowship.) Mr. WHITE gave a report of the work repeating some of the details that he had given at the afternoon meeting for the sake of friends present who were not able to attend the earlier gathering.

Mr. White told of a new development that had taken place since last they met, the acquisition at Tiptree of a Holiday and Convalescent Home for the children.

He began his address by saying: We are very glad to have such a large company of uncles and aunts, and to know that there are so many interested in this work, and who thus show their interest by coming and having fellowship with us on this our Anniversary day. It is a great thing to know the will of God, and not only to know it, but to do it. We can learn what the will of God is through the Scriptures. The Scriptures have been given to us as a compass to guide us through life. Several of our prayer-partners have gone to be with the Lord. It may be that ere we meet again some of us may be at Home with Him. But God who buries His workmen carries on His work, and we hope that God will raise up many others to pray for this work. As we seek to do the will of God we gain knowledge from Him. There are thousands of people who know the will of God, but there are very few who are really doing it. They are not prepared to go the whole way for God. We pray that as a result of our coming together at these anniversary gatherings we may get to know the will of God, and carry it out. This is the only way in which we can experience the joy which He gives. If we know God's will, and are not doing it, we do not experience His joy. There are no people anywhere so happy as those who do the will of God. There are possibly some eight hundred people here. What a difference it would make if all present here who knew the will of God would from henceforth seek to carry it out! "The joy of the Lord shall be your strength." "I have found David, the son of Jesse, which shall fulfil all My will." Godliness produces God-likeness. Those who do the will of God are well-pleasing to Him. If we are well-pleasing to Him we are giving joy to the heart of God. That is the great thing that you and I should strive for. If we have really been born into His family we should certainly live on these lines. That is my subject this evening—the will of God. And "it is not the will of God that one of these little ones should perish." God wants the boys and girls. Let us dedicate our hearts and lives afresh to Him for THIS service.

We have had another wonderful year regarding the bill of health in the Homes. We put it down to prayer, to regular habits, good food, and cod liver oil; and the result is that we have very few chest troubles. We thank God for our three doctors, dentist, chiropodist and chartered accountants who give their services without payment, and for the workers who labour in the Homes night and day.

Mr. LEOPOLD HARRIS (Chairman) said: We have listened to a marvellous story of God's wonderful work. To many who knew nothing of the grace and power of God it would seem almost like a fairy tale; but we know it is true. There are one or two things, which, as Chairman, I must say.

I got this word in my reading this morning. "Let all those that put their trust in Thee rejoice; let them ever shout for joy, because Thou defendest them; let them also that love Thy name be joyful in Thee." When I read those words I could not help thinking of the gathering here. Mr. White and his co-workers have put their trust in the Lord to a degree which perhaps is experienced by very few Christians; therefore it is given to them to rejoice in a peculiar way, and to an exceptional degree. And we are here to-night to rejoice with them, and to praise God for His loving kindness and faithfulness.

Now to me, and I am sure to many of you, this work is nothing less than an inspiration. It is an encouragement to us to go on in our small way in the Lord's work. It is a wonderful testimony of the power of prayer. We realise something of the difficulties and the anxieties and the cares of a great work such as Mr. White and his helpers are carrying on in the name of the Lord. How do they do it? It can only be that they are continually seeking the Lord, and He hears them, and delivers them out of all their fears. We know that even a family of three or four can be an anxiety. But think of this large family? These children may be an anxiety but how healthy and happy they are. During all these years

the Lord has provided, and the Lord can be counted upon to continue to provide for them. This is a great occasion when we make together to rejoice with them in the Lord, and to make our boast in the Lord.

Dr. FREDK. T. ELLIS, said: I met a friend recently who told me that he was going to Bath to take the waters to strengthen him up. I was asked by someone to-day, "What are you going to do to-night?" I replied "I am going to South Woodford Baptist Church to take the waters!" "I didn't know there was a Hydro there," he said. "I am going to the annual meeting of Mr. WHITE'S Home, and if you want to get a real tonic, that's the place to go to." So I have come here to 'take the waters,' and I already feel invigorated by this meeting. What a wonderful gathering! What a fine spirit prevails here year by year. It would be a bit of sound advice to invite discouraged Christians to come here, those whose faith has been shaken. They would go back to their respective spheres of labour re-invigorated to carry on the work of God. I am connected with the Bible Testimony Fellowship. What a Bible Testimony you here have to give! And what a fellowship! It is indeed a Bible Testimony Fellowship that you enjoy here. I was delighted to hear that report of the work given by Mr. White. He is so full of energy and enthusiasm and faith, and yet withal he is so humble in mind and heart. It does us all good to come into contact with him. And now to think that God, in answer to prayer, has given you that magnificent place at Tiptree. It's a sweet place; they make jam there. I have no doubt that we shall all want to pay it a visit. I shall really have to warn our Town Council at Felixstowe about this new development of yours, for they will be casting an envious eye upon it! I do indeed join with you tonight in thanksgiving to God for another year of testimony to his goodness, and another year of evidence as to the reality of faith in God. He is still our Father, and He is still answering the prayers of His believing people, as the Report to-night has given us abundant evidence.

There is a story in the Old Testament with which most of us are familiar; we have been familiar with it from our childhood's days. It is the story of Moses, who, one day as he was counting his sheep in the desert, saw a bush aflame with fire, but which was not consumed. And Moses was very anxious to investigate the mystery, and he turned aside to see the great sight. And you remember how God spoke to him out of the burning bush in the desert, and said, "I want you to go and deliver My people from bondage." We read that Moses said to God: "If I go and talk to the people and tell them that the God of their fathers hath sent me unto them, they will say, What is His name? what shall I say unto them?" God said "Tell them I AM hath sent me unto you." I AM—that was the Name that God gave Himself. For centuries the world kept asking—I am—what? Then Christ came, and when He grew up to be a Man, and when He started to preach and teach, He said, "You have been waiting to know what God is like. I AM is My name." "I am the Bread of life." "I am the Water of life." "I am the way, the truth, and the life." "I am the Resurrection and the life." And when Jesus was crucified, and rose again from the dead, and ascended into the glory, He gave to the beloved disciple, John, a wonderful vision on the Isle of Patmos. And once again He took up that beautiful title of God, and He said, "I am Alpha and Omega, the first and the last." "Alpha" and "Omega" are really the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet. So Jesus Christ really said, "I am the A and the Z, and I am all that lies between."

I want to take up that word of the Lord Jesus, and I want to say four simple things about it.

1. You cannot exhaust Jesus. Think of the millions of books there are in the world to-day. All kinds of books; books of history, of science, of religion. But those writers only used

the twenty-six letters of the alphabet. They took those letters and they juggled with them and they marshalled them together, and the result was a book. How wonderful it is when you think of all the books that have been written. You cannot exhaust those twenty-six letters. And you can never exhaust Jesus. People have been receiving blessing from Him through the centuries, and He has heard their cry, and met their need; and still to-night we can go to Him; and right to the very end of time people will still be able to go to Jesus and it will be so throughout eternity.

2. You cannot do without Jesus. I might go to the British Museum library, and see those valuable books arranged on those shelves there containing so much information, but they are no good to me unless I know the alphabet; you will never get at their secrets apart from the alphabet. You cannot do without the alphabet, and you cannot do without Jesus. Without Him life is a blank; you cannot understand things. You cannot understand history apart from Him. You cannot understand the Bible apart from Jesus. He is the very centre of the Bible. He is the central Figure in the pages both of the Old and New Testaments. And unless we know Jesus we cannot understand the Bible. We must have Him if we would understand the future, if we would understand history, if we would understand the Bible. Some people are dreading the future. But some of us know ultimately what is going to happen. One day He is coming back to rule and reign. We know that the future is in His hands, that He is Sovereign, and that He is going to reign for ever and ever.

3. You cannot get away from Jesus. There is nothing before "A" and there is nothing after "Z." He is before all things, and He continues after all things have ceased to be. And He abides all the way along. He does not drop us at "R" or "S" or "T." He carries us right through to the end. The young convert need not fear the future. He will be with Him right through to the end. He is "the Author and finisher of our faith."

4. You cannot fail to find in Him the supply of all your needs. No two of us are alike. Your needs may not be my needs. And your needs to-day are different to those of to-morrow. Yet if you wanted to tell me exactly what your needs were, and I wanted to tell you what my needs were, we should both use the same alphabet. You would find in those twenty-six letters of the alphabet sufficient for you to express your need, and I should also. And your need and mine is met in Christ. The lover writing to his beloved, the judge passing sentence in a criminal court, the poet writing his verses, the preacher preaching his sermon, the lawyer dealing with his client—they all use the twenty-six letters of the alphabet. We can express our need in the alphabet no matter what that need may be, for the alphabet is so plastic. And you cannot fail to find in Christ all that you need.

Even the boys and girls will remember this. I am so glad that I learned my A.B.C. when I was young, for now I can enjoy reading books, and I can enjoy reading THE Book. There was a time when folk did not love Jesus. But when they were converted, when the Spirit of God spoke to them, and they were born again and made new creatures, then Jesus became to them the altogether lovely One, and now that Jesus is their "A" and "Z" they love Him, and love that which is highest. And knowing Him they have the key to all that has gone before, and to all that is to come. And they have the key to this sacred Book.

God bless you, Mr. White, and your co-workers in this great enterprise for God, and may you discover in the Lord Jesus Christ in a deeper measure than you have ever yet discovered that He is to you "the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the ending."

Our Convalescent and Holiday Centre.

On Saturday, July 16th the above was opened by a public praise meeting and a glorious time experienced. We were delighted to see a company of nearly 400 present to tea at 4 o'clock, after which an opportunity was given for friends to see round, and a praise meeting held at which the Rev. KENNETH C. PARKINSON, M.A., MESSRS. J. R. STARK and JAMES STOKES gave very helpful messages. Pieces were rendered by some of our children who had travelled down by special coach

The chair was taken by MR. HERBERT WHITE who said "In our last year's report we stated that we had been led to purchase a house known as The Grove, Tiptree, to be used for the above purpose, four friends having kindly given us between them the purchase money—£1,250. Many alterations had to be made and a further £840 had to be spent. Towards paying for this we had £500 on "The Forward Move" account and the Lord has led seven other friends to send in gifts, making up this amount.

We have gathered here today for the special purpose of lifting up our hearts in praise to God for His goodness in giving to us this beautiful place for our Convalescent and Holiday Centre and we are delighted to see such a goodly company who have come—many from long distances to praise God with us. It is sometime since we felt the need of a place like this in connection with our work, and after much prayer, here we are today, proving by an up to date experience that "God answers prayer." For you who are here present, with many who are absent, who are our prayer partners we praise God, as we can all rejoice together in recording "God's faithfulness to usward who believe." We desire that this place should be for His glory and that it may be used by our workers and children as occasion arises and tired christian workers. Will you please continue to pray that God will help us to develop this centre for His own glory and that we hear Him say "This is the way—walk ye in it."

Mr. Stokes referred to the fact that when entering the grounds he noticed the board on which it was stated that the homes were "Founded 1899." 1899 to 1938 seemed a far cry. What changes had taken place in that period.

During that time we have seen the introduction of Telephones, Motor Cars, Electric Trams and Light, Wireless, Aeroplanes, Airships, Submarines, Cinematographs. During that time the face of Europe had changed. The political outlook in our own country had changed. Fashions had changed. The ladies were aware of that. What lady present would dare to have visited Tiptree in the fashions of 1899. 1899—1938 Yes; a far cry registering many changes. But one thing has not changed i.e., the nature and dynamic of the work known as the Children's Home and Mission, South Woodford. This work had met the trials and tribulations of a changing world and emerged triumphantly, to which this extension at Tiptree bore eloquent testimony. How had they been able to STAND, and having done all

to stand against the mad rush of modernism. The reason lay here. They had not changed their ideal or altered their faith in the reality of faithfulness of God. They had maintained the vision. They could, like the Apostle Paul, when reviewing his life before King Agrippa, declare "They had not been disobedient unto the heavenly vision." This was the governing secret of the Apostle Paul's splendid life for God. The fountain of his amazing energies, so recklessly expended in the cause of Christ, and with such immeasurable result, is to be found in his vision of the crucified.

Once assured as to the demands of Christ. St. Paul never swerved from the course dictated by the will of God. It involved sacrifice and loss. It led him into paths from which mere human nature would have shrunk. But none of these things moved him. He had seen the vision that became the absorbing passion of his life.

Our friends too at Woodford had seen the vision splendid and all through the years had maintained a loyal obedience to it. Tiptree was a result of that faith and loyalty.

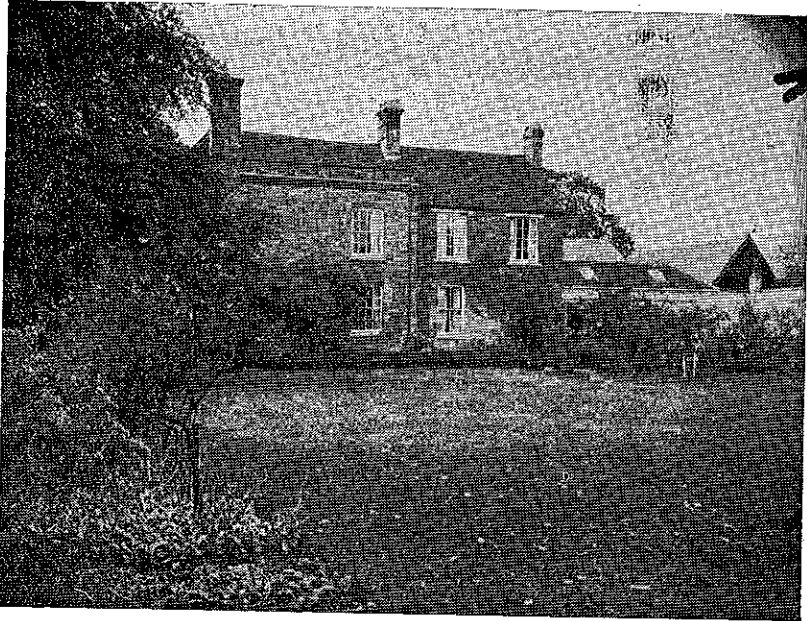

Is not Tiptree and the wonder of its change to what we see to day a challenge to us all.

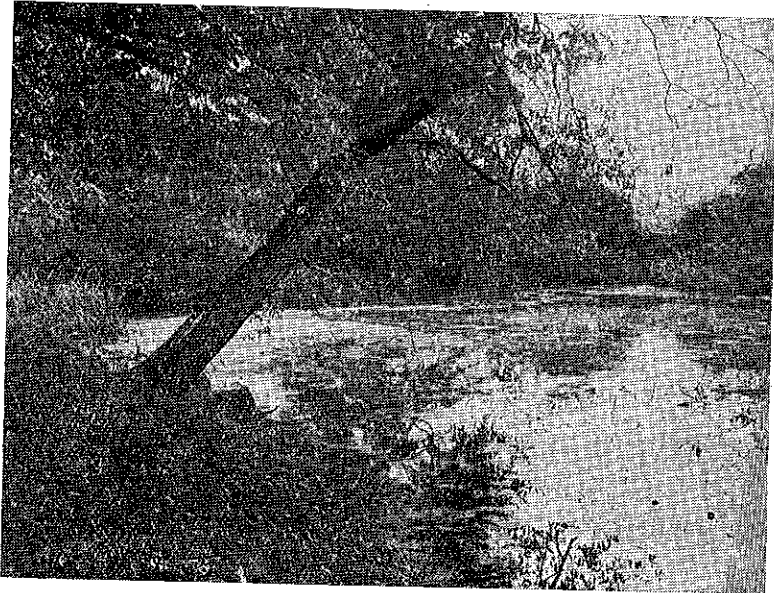
Shall we not catch the vision to-day. Is not God's faithfulness writ large across the very threshold of this building and grounds. The challenge to each one of us is "Are we going to be obedient to the vision, are we going to obey the call."

For the first time in the history of our work we were able to take our children away from Woodford for the holiday. We went by coach to Tiptree, a lorry preceding us with beds, etc. and stayed the whole month of August away. The children had a right royal time, playing in the fields, trying to catch fish in the lake, etc. A friend sent us along a see-saw which greatly delighted the children, and to make a break we had two outings to Maldon, leaving soon after breakfast, taking our luncheons and returning to a late tea. We feel this was all worth while, as over 60 returned built up by the holiday and ready for the winter. Hallelujah!

Friends will be further glad to hear that three of our prayer partners have bought nearly two acres of land adjoining our property at Tiptree and handed the same over to our work. This will make over 9 acres, and will enable us to produce vegetables for our use. We were of course late in sowing this year, but nevertheless we have grown 4 tons of potatoes, vegetables, etc. and tomatoes. All of which greatly help in providing for the children.



THE GROVE, TIPTREE. 'SIDE' VIEW AND LAWN.



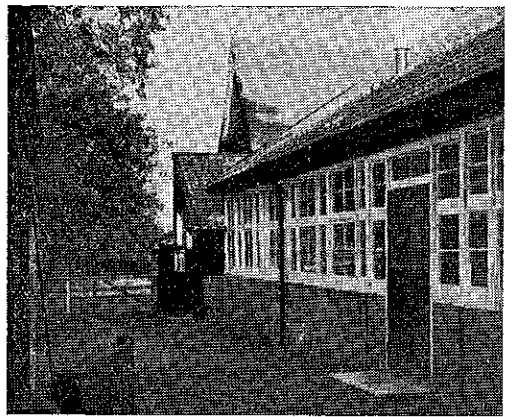
VIEW OF LAKE. THE GROVE, TIPTREE.



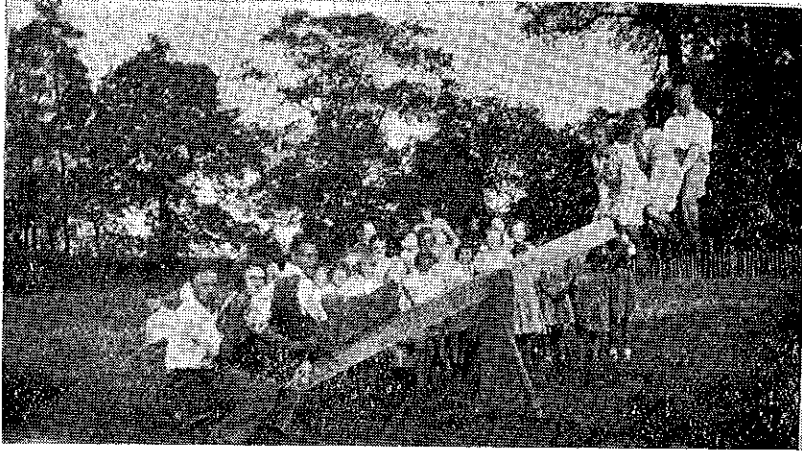
FRONT VIEW. THE GROVE, TIPFREE.



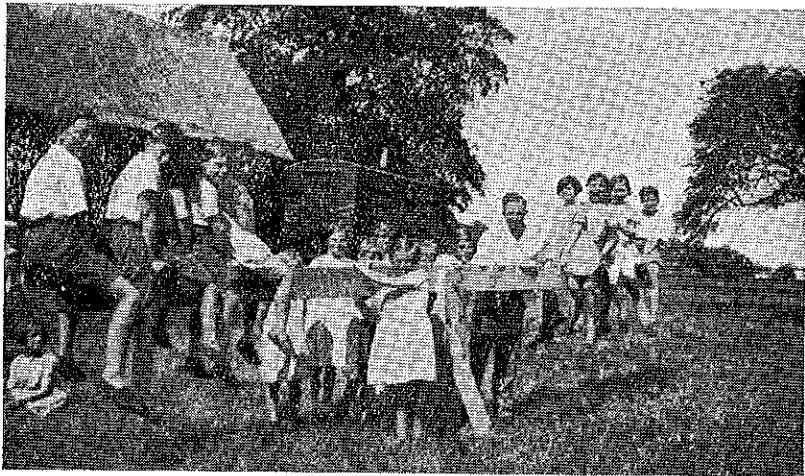
