

because we do not attain this in our own strength: we can only attain to it through the "strength which God supplies through His eternal Son." Through Him we can live that life of holiness: we can be filled with the Holy Spirit. God has made ample and full provision for the empowering of every life. I only met Dr. Chapman once, and I remember on that occasion he put his hand on my shoulder, and he said, My boy, remember this, "When we yield ourselves to God, what he claims, He will cleanse: what he cleanses, He will fill with His Spirit: what He fills with His Spirit He will use for His glory." I believe that is true of us to-day. What is it that God claims? He claims our body: He claims our mind: He claims our spirit: He claims our all: the whole personality: and if we yield our whole personality to Him, body, soul, and spirit, He will cleanse by the blood: and what He cleanses He will fill by His Holy Spirit, and He will fill to overflowing. And those who are thus Spirit-filled He will use for His glory, and in His service. I pray God that everyone of us may go away from this meeting, and face this task of ours, asking God to make this motto "Holiness unto the Lord" true in our own individual experience from this time forth and even for evermore.

Mr. A. L. EMMONS, in the closing address of the day, quoted from Acts 6. 5, and 8. "And they chose Stephen a man full of faith and of the Holy Ghost." And Stephen, full of faith and power, did great wonders and miracles among the people." Mr. Emmons said: I am in hearty agreement with all that I have listened to this afternoon, and this evening, and especially with the practical message of Dr. Ellis. Something along those same lines has been passing through my mind, for I feel a deep and urgent need for a practical application of the Christian Gospel in these lives of ours. Would to God that there was that in our lives which might tally with what Dr. Ellis has been telling us of our dealings in our commercial life, in our home life, and in our Church life. We long for these things, we see the necessity for them, but how can we put them into practical effect. I would suggest that in the two Scriptures which I have quoted we have a line of truth in which this high standard of holiness may be attained. If there was to be "Holiness unto the Lord" there must be a life of prayer, a life of faith. As they read the Old Testament they must be impressed with the various occasions when men were bowed before God in prayer. A series of articles appeared in a well-known paper some years ago, entitled "If I could begin again," and the first writer was none other than Admiral Evans of "The Broke," and he said, "If I had my time over again, I would pray more;" and he gave descriptions of the various tight corners in which he had found himself in the course of his life. "I believe that one of the things which we have lost in the Christian Church," said Mr. Emmons, "and which we need to recover is the exercise of prayer, the setting aside, as God gives us the opportunity, of periods of prayer and communion with Him, and working it out in faith, so that there may be produced in these lives of ours "Holiness unto the Lord."

I would suggest to you four things in connection with the life of prayer. I remember having a letter from a young girl some years ago; she wrote to me from a sanatorium; and it was on this wise. 'I am here in this place with plenty of time to think. And looking back over this last year or so God has

been showing me that I have neglected to read His Word, and to pray. But whilst here I have been brought back into that blessed holy fellowship of prayer, and have been enjoying sweet communion with my Lord.' I can visualise the scene in my mind's eye of that sad and solemn occasion, with her father standing by her bedside, as she passed into the presence of the Lord with a smile upon her face. The same thing may be striking our hearts and consciences tonight. We know that we have not attained to this holy standard. It may be that we have failed in this holy life of prayer. It may be that as a result of our meeting here tonight, we shall be so wrought upon by the Holy Spirit, and so helped by this Christian fellowship, that our lives will be enriched, and we shall become men and women of fervent prayer, leading to a deeper faith in the living God, so that we shall produce in our lives "Holiness unto the Lord."

There are these four things in connection with prayer that I would like to mention. The practice of prayer. The pattern of prayer. The precept in prayer. The promise of prayer.

THE PRACTICE OF PRAYER. As you read through the four Gospels you find that there are many occasions when the Blessed Son of God breathed out His prayers to God His father. It would be interesting to enumerate the occasions when he resorted to the mountain-top to pray. During His earthly life He was constantly in touch with God. And I believe the blessing and success which has attended Mr. White's Homes has been because those at the helm have been men and women of personal holiness. If our Lord thus gives us a picture of prayer, how much more we in our individual lives need this constant fellowship with God! I want to impress upon your hearts the necessity for constancy in prayer, and that our hearts may be so yielded up to God, that like Admiral Evans, we shall want to pray more.

In the Lord's Prayer we have our **PATTERN IN PRAYER.** There is that relationship which exists between the child of God and the Father. We are able to breathe out our desires to God in prayer.

We have also **THE PRECEPT IN PRAYER.** I suggest that this has a twofold application. There is, first of all, the Christian experience; and, secondly, there is the responsibility of the Christian witness. People are in the dark to-day by reason of the circumstances of these evil times: they are being side-tracked by the evil devices of the devil. And, undoubtedly, there are thousands of people who are spiritually hungry, and who need to be satisfied. But they can only find true satisfaction of soul as they turn to God in prayer. Christ is the Light of the world, and He is the Bread of life. And what of our Christian witness? Let us ask ourselves, What have we to give to men who are lost in the darkness of fear and doubt? Our only answer is that we have nothing to give, but we know of One Who can satisfy them.

Lastly, there is **THE PROMISE OF PRAYER.** "Ask and it shall be given you. Seek and ye shall find. Knock and it shall be opened unto you." Ask in faith; ask in the Name that is above every Name, and it shall be given you. There is nothing that He will withhold from them that love Him. So that being men and women of prayer, and of faith, our influence will be felt not only in the Church, but by those who are outside, and who by that same influence will be led to seek Christ for themselves.
