
Christmas Eve 2024



Love

This communion service begins with a lighted candle, named Love, on a map of the world, bread and wine, and the first scene on the triptych. There is quiet Christmas music.

Leader On Christmas Eve we come together to prepare our hearts as we revisit the manger, at Bethlehem. At a still point in the turning world, we ask that we may be helped to receive God's gift of Jesus with fresh wonder. The pictures that make up this year's triptych are all new. They represent three fruits of the Spirit that were revealed uniquely in Jesus: Love, Joy, and Peace. During this communion service we focus on the first of these, Love.

Sharing God's Gift of Peace

Hearing God's Word

Two Bible readings.

From the Old Testament:

The LORD passed before Moses and said, "The LORD, the LORD, He is a merciful and gracious God, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness, keeping steadfast love for thousands, forgiving iniquity and transgression and sin..." Exodus 34: 6

From the New Testament:

See what great love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are! The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Dear friends, now we are children of God, and what we will be, has not yet been made known. But we know that when Christ appears, we shall be like him, for we shall see him as he is.

This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down his life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters. If anyone has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has no pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person? Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth." 1 John 3 (from verses 1-18)

Triptych One: Love

A Reflection on the Manger and the Cross

The first part of the triptych this year is set in the fields close to Bethlehem. It is a clear, starlit night.

There are two prominent features: a manger and a cross.

Taken together they reveal the heart of the good news of Christmas, and of the love of God.

The name given to the baby wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in the manger was, of course, Jesus. This was not the choice of Mary or Joseph, but of God. And, like the name Joshua, it means rescuer or saviour. Jesus was God's gift to the world, long promised. and sent with a mission: to save the world from the ravages of human sin.

As Jesus grew up, He lived in a radically new way, brimming with grace, truth, forgiveness and love. But that was not how He saved the world. It was only when he was completely abandoned and rejected by everyone, and nailed to a cross by Roman soldiers, that the birth in a manger made complete sense.

Mary, his mother pondered the reason for her son's birth all through his life, and she was agonisingly close to the cross when he died. As she looked back, one scarlet thread was woven all through the fabric of the story.

John the Baptist had called Jesus, "the Lamb of God that takes away the sin of the world".

And remarkably, she had given birth to Jesus at Bethlehem. This was a town often mentioned in the Scriptures. In her time, it was the place where shepherds raised lambs specifically for the purpose of Passover sacrifices.

There was a watchtower where shepherds looked out for ewes about to give birth. When this happened, they would take the ewe to a stable and assist in the birth to avoid any accidents and to detect any blemishes. The lambs for sacrifice had to be perfect. The shepherds would inspect newborn lambs, and those without blemish would be wrapped in strips of cloth to keep them warm and safe.

As she watched Jesus die, Mary found she was being taken back not only to his birth, but further than this, right back to this thread in the tapestry of the Scriptures.

All through the Jewish Scriptures people longed for the Promised, the Anointed One, the embodiment of God's unfailing, enduring love.

Her son was not to rule as a great earthly king or emperor, but to give His life as the Lamb of God, and in doing so to take on himself the sin of the world. He was the Passover Lamb: all the others were just copies.

Tonight, we thank God that Mary was willing to offer herself to be the mother of Jesus, the Lamb of God.

Those who dare to ponder it all, like her, never get over God's love as shown by what happened on the Cross of Calvary.

This, this is the true love that the writers of the Gospels and the Epistles describe for their readers.

Here is a song that provides simple words to describe such love. It was a favourite hymn of Victor White, and often sung on Good Friday here in this room.

It is a thing most wonderful, almost too wonderful to be, that God's own Son should come from heav'n, and die to save a child like me.

I cannot tell how He could love a child so weak and full of sin; His love must be most wonderful if He could die my love to win.

I sometimes think about the cross, and shut my eyes, and try to see the cruel nails and crown of thorns, and Jesus crucified for me.

It is most wonderful to know His love for me so free and sure; but 'tis more wonderful to see my love for Him so faint and poor.

And yet I want to love Thee, Lord; O light the flame within my heart, and I will love Thee more and more, until I see Thee as Thou art.

Leader The One you appointed to be ruler of the world was crucified. Forgive the ways in which we have been unfaithful to our rightful Lord.

All We have sinned: forgive and heal us.

Together Almighty God, who forgives all who truly repent have mercy upon us, pardon and deliver us from all our sins, confirm and strengthen us in all goodness, and keep us in life eternal, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Leader With thanks and praise, O God, we come to your table of love. For Jesus Christ on the night during which he was betrayed took bread, gave thanks, broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat, this is my body which is given for you. Do this, as often as you eat in remembrance of me."

After the supper, Jesus also took the cup and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, "Take and drink. This cup is my blood which is shed for the many for the forgiveness of sin. Drink all of it in remembrance of me."

Rejoice and be glad for this child of Mary is the Lamb of God, the Saviour through whom we have eternal life. Father God, send your Holy Spirit now so that we may dance for joy in the light of your promise of hope. All Let this gift of salvation be ours for time and

eternity.

Leader God's grace has called us here; let us partake

of Christ's gift for all ages.

Declaring our Faith

We believe in God the Creator, who made us and all things, giving us all the gift of life, who set us on our path in this world.

We believe in God the Saviour, who is one with the Creator, who rescued us and all creation from the dire consequences of our violations against God and creation. This man, Jesus of Nazareth, the Christ, the Light of the World, took on human form having been born of Mary through the power of the Holy Spirit. The candle named Love remains on the map at Bethlehem, a sign that the Light of Christ's love still shines in the darkness. Quiet music is played.
