

DEAR FRIENDS,

CAN GOD? 78 Psalm, 19.—GOD CAN! 3 Eph., 20.

. This question was brought before us a few days since by a brother speaking at the week-night service in connection with our Mission; a question which has often confronted us in our

work here amongst the children. "Can God" has often been the query when tested and tried by circumstances which have appeared to be against us.

This query, we believe, is dishonoring to God and we find in the Psalm quoted it met with a severe rebuke when God heard His people so argue, after He had proved Himself to be the one who had led and fed them for so long. There are many people to-day both in the world and among the professing Christians who are allowing the devil to impress upon their hearts this query or doubt as to whether God is able to do all things and some are even going so far as to suggest that even the things which His word says He did do, both in the Old and New Testament, are wrong because their minds cannot grasp the truth. We can but speak from experience and our testimony is (after eight years in a work of this kind) not that of doubt and Can God, but that of certainty and God Can. We have proved that by simple dependence upon Him our prayers have been answered respecting the health of the children who have been quite free from sickness and disease for now more than 14 months. That workers when required have been sent along by Him. That funds without appeal have been forthcoming from all quarters and that "He has furnished us a table in the Wilderness." Can God? Yes, emphatically yes: -3 Eph., 20. Then we have been asked, will this work continue to go on? Our reply is, It is going on and will continue to do so as long as He thinks fit. We have no props whatever and are solely dependent upon Him and are willing to follow just and only where He leads. It is true that we have not had all that we want but we have had all that He has seen fit to send and we take this as one of the "all things" and good for our spiritual training.

We started the year with 55 children and have now under our care 70 and it is most gratifying to us to report that many out of that number are decided Christians.

The Working Parties started by friends for the purpose of helping us to clothe the children have again done splendidly during the year. Seven Kings have forwarded us over 120 garments.

Our Seventh Annual Meetings were held in the Memorial Hall and were well attended. Rev. A. A. Savage presided at the afternoon meeting, the chief speaker being Mrs. Charles Barclay. In the evening the Rev. H. S. Saunders, M.A., presided, supported by Mrs. Charles Barclay, Rev. Trevor Fielder with Messrs. Shephard, V. G. Levett, J. J. Blundell and J. A. Aylott. Letters were read from Miss. L. M. Fowler, Dr. Flegg, Rev. G. A. Hamson and Rev. J. Jermyn, regretting their inability to be present.

During the Meetings selections of music were rendered by the children, who acquitted themselves in a style which reflected great credit on Mrs. Aylott, their instructress.
